Please find a partner and pick a paper by next week. Presentations ought to be about 15 minutes and we'll allow 5-10 minutes for questions. Typically, it won't be possible to present the whole paper, so you should pick out key details you want to present. Answering these questions about the paper may help organize your presentation.

- What is the problem the authors are addressing?
- What is the insight the authors are trying to make use of?
- How do they formalize this insight?
- Is there an example which illustrates the problem, the insight, and the formalization?
